
About Sterling

Sterling is filled with hundreds of acres of public parks, scenic trails and views, and is just a short drive to the nation's capital. Sterling is one of the most walkable areas in Northern Virginia and offers residents everything from history, arts, dining and shopping and more. Today, nearly 29,000 residents live, work, play, and enjoy Sterling as their home.

Where to Live

The Sterling area has a diverse set of neighborhoods that can accommodate just about any pace – and stage – of life. A few sought-after neighborhoods are in close proximity to a variety of things to do, including national parks, shopping and so much more.

- <u>Potomac Falls</u> (Slightly North of Sterling) This neighborhood offers more of a country and equestrian feel than suburban, and each home sits on about two acres of land. It's no wonder why some residents here have remained for generations.
- <u>Sugarland Run</u> Homes and townhomes in Sugarland Run are built in California-contemporary style and offer several neighborhood perks including two community centers, an Olympic-sized pool, playgrounds, walking trails, fields and courts and more.
- <u>CountrySide</u> This community on the Potomac River offers beautiful, family homes in a vibrant community. Residents have access to several trails, a catch-and-release pond, tennis courts, pool and neighborhood events.
- The Cascades This planned community is one of the most sought-after neighborhoods along the Potomac River. The community offers a private fitness center, five swimming pools, 25 playgrounds, tennis courts, bocce ball and soccer facilities. It's a great community for anyone from young professionals to families.



Getting Around Town

Though Sterling is close to Washington, D.C., the metro does not stop through this area. However, Route 28 and Leesburg Pike are conveniently located along Sterling and will take residents all across Northern Virginia. The Loudoun County Transit also stops through several locations in Sterling, Dulles, Purcellville and more areas.

Museums



National Museum of Natural History

The National Museum of Natural History provides a plethora of opportunities to learn more about natural history, science, national collections, and research – not to mention that it is free and open 364 days a year! Some of its most popular exhibits include the Hope Diamond and one of the oldest known Earth rocks (3.96 billion years old!). For more information, visit naturalhistory.si.edu.

Heritage Farm Museum

Explore the rich agricultural heritage and more than 250 years of Northern Virginia history at the Heritage Farm Museum. The museum offers a variety of exhibits, summer camps and programs and events for the whole family. For more information visit www.loudounmuseum.com.

National Air and Space Museum

The National Air and Space Museum holds the largest collection of historic air and spacecraft travel in the world, including the 1903 Wright Flyer and the Apollo 11 Command Module. The Air and Space Museum is arguably the most popular tourist attraction in the area, with nearly 7.5 million visitors in 2016, making it the second most visited museum in the world! United States Holocaust Museum

The Holocaust Museum serves as the United States' official memorial to the Holocaust. The museum exhibits literature, documentation, and studies from or about the time of the Holocaust. Since its dedication, nearly 40 million visitors from all nationalities and religious backgrounds have come to learn more and increase awareness of the Holocaust. National Museum of African American History and Culture

The National Museum of African American History and Culture is the newest Smithsonian museum, opening in September 2016. The museum is the home to 37,000 objects focusing on important areas such as religion, culture, civil rights, slavery, segregation, art, and history. Newseum

The Newseum is a popular destination located in the heart of downtown Washington, D.C. This seven-level interactive museum features 15 theaters and 15 galleries, all of which explore free expression and the First Amendment, while conserving the history and evolution of journalism and communication throughout the world. Famous exhibits include the Berlin Wall Gallery, which displays sections of the wall and the spying and journalism efforts that went into its history. You'll see Today's Front Pages Gallery that displays the daily front pages of more than 80 international newspapers. The Newseum is a fun and enriching learning experience for people of all ages. International Spy Museum

If you're a fan of James Bond and Jason Bourne, then you'll love the International Spy Museum, located in the Penn Quarter neighborhood of Washington D.C. This museum has many interactive features and exhibits like Operation Spy, where you have one hour to complete a series of "spy missions." For more information, visit www.spymuseum.org.

National Museum of American History

The National Museum of American History is dedicated to the preservation of the political, social, scientific, cultural, and military history of the United States. One of the most popular artifacts is the original Star-Spangled Banner, the flag that inspired Francis Scott Key to write the national anthem. The National Museum

Historical Sites



Lincoln Memorial

Overlooking the Reflecting Pool, the Lincoln Memorial was built to commemorate our 16th President, Abraham Lincoln. Designed with a Greek Doric temple architecture on the outside with a carved and a seated statue of Abraham Lincoln on the inside, the aesthetic appeal and architecture technique makes this memorial a popular tourist attraction. The Lincoln Memorial is also the site for where many famous speeches have taken place, including Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech. For more information, visit www.nps.gov/linc.

Washington Monument

Located on the National Mall, east of the Reflecting Pool, the Washington Monument was made to honor the nation's first president, George Washington. The monument is not only renowned for its historical significance, but also for being the world's largest stone structure and the world's largest obelisk. Jefferson Memorial

The Jefferson Memorial was built to commemorate Thomas Jefferson, the third U.S. President and the principal author of the Declaration of Independence. The Jefferson Memorial is located on the Tidal Basin, and in 2007, was listed <u>fourth on the American Institute of Architects' "List of America's Favorite Architecture."</u> For more information, visit <u>www.nps.gov/thje/index.htm</u>.

Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial

Spanning four acres of the National Mall, the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial honors Dr. King's legacy for freedom and equality. The highlights of the memorial are a granite sculpture of Martin Luther King, Jr., titled, Stone of Hope, and the Inscription Wall, which features 14 quotes from Dr. King. National World War II Memorial

The World War II Memorial consists of 56 pillars and small arches surrounding a fountain and a plaza located on the National Mall in Washington, D.C. The U.S. Capitol

The Capitol's website says it best, "The United States Capitol is a monument, a working office building, and one of the most recognizable symbols of representative democracy in the world." Theaters, Music Venues and Popular Events

Wolf Trap National Park for the Performing Arts

One town over in Vienna, the Wolf Trap National Park for the Performing Arts, more commonly known as "Wolf Trap" to many locals, is a performing arts center located on 117 acres of national park land. The center is run by both the National Park Service and the Wolf Trap Foundation for the Performing Arts, a non-profit foundation. Jiffy Lube Live

Jiffy Lube Live is one of the region's largest outdoor amphitheaters – located in Bristow, Virginia – with a capacity of more than 25,000. The venue's size and open-air atmosphere make it the go-to venue for big-name acts like John Mayer and Brad Paisley during the warmer months of the year. 9:30 Club

The 9:30 Club is one of area's most popular destinations for live music – attracting nationally acclaimed rock bands despite its relatively small space. It has a capacity of approximately 1,200 people, leading to many sell-out shows. For more information, visit www.930.com.

John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts

The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, more commonly known as "the Kennedy Center," is one of the most prestigious theatres in the country. Not only does it host performances like the National Symphony Orchestra, its architecture is something to behold. It has seven theaters, most famous of which are the Concert Hall and Opera House. The Grand Foyer features 63-foot ceilings, chandeliers, and amazing views of Georgetown. For more information, visit kennedy-center.org.

National Theatre

The National Theatre is a 1,676-seat venue that is both historic and entertaining. In the past, the theatre has hosted famous speakers such as Winston Churchill. Warner Theatre

Originally a movie palace, known for its rooftop garden, a basement ballroom and restaurant, the Warner Theatre is now used as a performance venue for comedies, speakers, musicians and dance groups. Dining

Fine Dining

Burtons Grill and Bar is a small, upscale dining room offering American cuisines in a stylish ambiance. **Mokomandy** is a casual, fine-dining establishment offering modern Korean and Cajun cuisine and is the 2018 winner of the Diners' Choice Award in Sterling. Mokomandy even has a food truck that can be rented for any private occasion. In 1999, Chef Todd and Ellen Gray opened **Equinox**, a fine-dining restaurant in D.C. with an emphasis on an innovative approach to American cuisine. Named one of the best restaurants in D.C. year after year, Equinox is a must try.

Casual Dining

The Bungalow Lakehouse is a local favorite and is located along Lake Center Plaza in Sterling. Patrons can choose from a variety of menus including small bites, brunch, late night and of course plenty of libations. The Bungalow Lakehouse also is a great space for large parties celebrating special occasions. What started as a food truck traveling around and servicing the busy business people of D.C., District Taco has now grown into one of the best taco places in the city. The restaurant has grown to several locations, but they are sticking to their roots and serving up their famous Yucatan style, Mexican cuisine with a focus on fresh ingredients. With American farmers in mind, Founding Farmer's is a family farmer-owned restaurant in D.C. taking the term 'from farm to table' to a whole new level. Serving up American cuisine with fresh ingredients, Founding Farmer's is a favorite for locals and those visiting the capital.

Wineries/Breweries

Located one town over in Ashburn, **Old Ox Brewery** is a family-owned and operated 30-barrel brew house. Take a tour of the brewery, enjoy one of their many craft beers in the tasting room or bring the family to one of its many weekly events. Crooked Run Brewing in downtown Loudon also has a taproom and taqueria in





Sterling. The Sterling Taproom is located right off the Washington & Old Dominion (W&OD) Trail and a great pit stop for cyclists to enjoy a brew and tacos.

And if beer is not your forte, choose from many wineries and cideries nearby. Just 20 minutes south of Sterling is **The Winery at Bull Run**, a farm vineyard focused on crafting fine Virginia whites while celebrating the history and preservation of the 19th century pastoral Fairfax County. West of Sterling is **Chrysalis Vineyards** located in the beautiful, rural city of Norton. Choose from a variety of locally grown European varieties while soaking in scenic valleys and hills. And for cider-lovers, **Wild Hare Hard Cider** offers a variety of ciders made with the Shenandoah Valley's finest apples and range from classic dry ciders and dry-hopped to ciders with a hint of sweetness.

Shopping

Dulles Town Centre

Conveniently located at the intersection of Route 28 and Route 7, Dulles Town Centre is at the heart of Dulles – and it's easy to see why! The area includes a mix of local and national stores and restaurants to enjoy. And while Dulles Town Centre offers thousands of complimentary parking spaces close to the shopping center, it's also just a short bike ride from the W&OD and has its very own bus service to the Wiehle-Reston Metro Station. Algonkian Regional Park

Great Falls Park

In nearby McLean, Great Falls Park is a National Parks Site with incredible views of the Potomac River. There is a \$10 entry fee per automobile, which is valid for three days.
