

## **Moving with Pets?**

## PRE MOVE

Clean out old items. Moves are time to start fresh. Discard any old or soiled items that you won't want to bring into your new home.

Shop. Depending on the distance you are moving, traveling to your new home can take several days. Make sure you are stocked on all the supplies your pet will need during transport.

Get new tags. When you get to your new home, your pet will not be familiar with their surroundings. Order new identification tags so if they get out, your pet will be able to be reunited with you quickly.

## **MOVE DAY**

Where is your pet? If you have not arranged for your pet to spend the day away from the home, designate an area in your home for them to be comfortable. Make sure to let the crew know where your pet will be kept to ensure everyone's safety.

## POST MOVE

Walk your dog around the neighborhood. Explore the neighborhood within the first few days of arrival; this will give your pet a chance to get familiar with their new surroundings and neighbors.
